The table above shows the 44 phonemes (sounds) in the English language and the common graphemes (spellings) associated. The table does not include all possible graphemes for a given phoneme. In cases where a grapheme corresponds to multiple phonemes, how it is realised may depend on its position in a word (c.f. *xylophone* and *box*), the surrounding letters (c.f. *wink* and *wind*), and the stress of the sound in a word (c.f. *above* and *azure*). Certain rules for spelling may be helpful for students e.g. -ve for a final /v/ sound. Words that do not follow a spelling pattern, notably the high-frequency words such as *are*, *me* and *were* should be taught as exceptions.

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
